--- Galatians 4:4-5 (KJV)

P: O Lord, let the words of my mouth

C: And the meditation of my heart

P: Be acceptable in Your sight,

Psalm 24 [Summary] *The LORD is the holy Creator. Only those who have a clean heart--that is, who are forgiven and are serving Him--stand before Him righteous. We welcome Jesus, with the “gates” of our hearts open!*

P: The earth is the Lord's, and all its fullness,

C: The world and those who dwell therein.

P: For He has founded it upon the seas,

C: And established it upon the waters.

P: Who may ascend into the hill of the Lord?

C: Or who may stand in His holy place?

P: He who has clean hands and a pure heart,

Hymn 73 vv. 1-4 (melody 3) Lift Up Your Heads, Ye Mighty Gates!

Old Testament: Isaiah 7:1-16 (selected verses)

Although King Ahaz, king of Judah, was a descendant of good King David, he was not a godly man. The kings of the neighboring nations of Syria and of Ephraim were about to attack him and Jerusalem his capital. God sent the prophet Isaiah to encourage Ahaz to trust the Lord, but he would not. Thus Isaiah warned him: There will be a better son and a better king than you, who will not be born your son,, but born by a miracle to a virgin. He will rescue the people. His name will be “Immanuel—God with Us.” Ahaz, you are done.

vv. 2-4a

P: And it was told to the house of David, saying, Syria’s forces are deployed in Ephraim! *[as allies]*.

C: So his heart and the heart of his people were moved, as the trees of the woods are moved with the wind.

P: Then the Lord said to Isaiah, Go out now to meet Ahaz, you and Shear-Jashub your son, at the end of the aqueduct from the upper pool, on the highway to the Fuller’s Field, and say to him:

C: Take heed, and be quiet.

P: Do not fear or be fainthearted for *[because of]* these two stubs of smoking firebrands.

vv. 7-9

C: Thus says the Lord God: It shall not stand, nor shall it come to pass.

P: For the head of Syria is Damascus *[capital]*, and the head of Damascus is Rezin *[king]*.

C: Within sixty-five years Ephraim will be broken, so that it will not be a people.

P: The head of Ephraim is Samaria *[capital]*, and the head of Samaria is Remaliah’s son *[king]*.

C: If you will not believe, Surely you shall not be established.

vv. 10-14

P: Moreover the Lord spoke again to Ahaz, saying,

C: Ask a sign for yourself from the Lord your God; ask it either in the Depth, or in the height above.”

P: But Ahaz said,

C: I will not ask, nor will I test the Lord!

P: Then he *[Isaiah]* said, Hear now, O house of David! Is it a small thing for you to weary men, but will you weary my God also?

C: Therefore the Lord Himself will give you a sign: Behold, the virgin shall conceive and bear a Son, and shall call His name IMMANUEL ! *[God with us]*.

Gospel Reading: Luke 1:5-23 When the time was just right, the Lord was ready to send His Son. First there would be a forerunner to prepare the hearts of the people—John the Baptist. John’s birth was by a miracle of God to the aged priest Zacharias and his wife Elizabeth, both well along in years.

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THE ADVENT WREATH: The Advent wreath is a Christian custom used in preparation for Christmas. Its origins appear to be from Lutheran circles in Germany during the 1800's. Originally a candle was lit each day in Advent to point children ahead to the great day of Christmas. Modifications have been made over the years. We now have one candle each week and one candle at Christmas. Various meanings and points of devotion exist regarding each of the candles.

THE 1ST ADVENT CANDLE (VIOLET—the color of repentance): The “Prophecy Candle” begins the period of waiting. It reminds us of the Old Testament promises/prophesies of the coming of the Savior from sin. With humble hearts of repentance awaiting the Savior from sin, we think back to the many believers before us who waited patiently and longingly for the promise of the Savior to be fulfilled.
